Out of Zone Enrolments

Enrolment at the school is governed by an enrolment scheme, details of which are available from the school office or our website.

enrolments@kkps.school.nz for application forms and further instructions or visit our website

The board has determined that 20 year 0/1, 10 year 2, 10 year 3 and 5 year 4 places are likely to be available for out-of-zone students next year. The exact number of places will depend on the number of applications received from students who live within the school's home zone.

Next year there will be 4 enrolment periods. The first enrolment period runs from first day of school in the new year to last day of term 1. For students seeking enrolment within the first enrolment period, the deadline for receipt of applications for out-of-zone places is Wednesday 11 October 2023

Parents of students who live within the home zone and intend enrolling their child at any time during the next year should notify the school as soon as possible to assist the school to plan appropriately for next year.

If the number of out-of-zone applications exceeds the number of places available, students will be

selected by ballot. If a ballot for outof-zone places is required, it will be held on Wednesday 18 October 2023. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the ballot within three school days of the ballot being held.

Details relating to the future enrolment periods are as follows:

Term 2. Deadline for receipt of applications: March 11th 2024 Date of ballot: March 18th 2024

Term 3. Deadline for receipt of applications: 11th May 2024 Date of ballot: 18th May 2024

Term 4. Deadline for receipt of applications: 11th August 2024 Date of ballot: 18th August 2024

Structured Literacy

At KKPS we use decodable texts in class to support our learners.

How can I support my child at home?

- Remind students to use their finger spelling when stuck on a word
- Encourage repeat readings to build fluency and phrasing
- Support correct phrasing by pointing out the punctuation

Differences between

Decodable books

Phonetically decodable text

Words used are in line with the child's phonics level

Main strategy for figuring out text: sounding out words

Irregular / more advanced phonics words are introduced gradually

Illustrations are supportive of the text.

Levelled books

Predictable text

Many words don't match the child's phonics skills

Main strategy for figuring out text: guessing

Many non-decodable words are used from the start

Illustrations reveal the story
and words on the book






Last newsletter we shone a light on the "Hour of Code" website which can be used to help develop Digital Literacy (coding). There are so many different opportunities to learn and practise skills.

In weeks 1 and 2 of Term 4 we will host auditions during Morning Tea and Lunch breaks.


10 Finalists will be chosen to perform at the 2023 Monster Mash on the 31st October.

Class of the fortnight Room 8 with Whaea Anna Rainey

Kōtuku (Akomanga e waru)

We've had an awesome term of learning in Kōtuku! These are a few of things we've been up to...

During pāngarau we learnt about symmetry. We used Pasifika tapa cloth as inspiration for our toi. We learnt lots of new kupu like: symmetrical, rotational symmetry, reflection, axes of symmetry and more!









We inquired into the traditional Maori art form of tukutuku. Tukutuku are the decorative wall panels that are inside a wharenui. We looked at the tukutuku panels inside Whitiora Marae. Some of the traditional cross stitched patterns we saw were pātiki, poutama and maunga tūpuna. We crafted our own tukutuku panels and wrote a pūrākau to match.

The tau rima tamariki mā (Year 5) have been enjoying being involved in 'Plant to Plate'. Every Rāpare they work in the māra kai me kīhini learning lots of new skills. Highlights have been planting seeds, finding butterflies, planting native trees and eating yummy kai!









Leanne Lupi has been volunteering for Plant to Plate for 2 years now, coming in every Thursday and helping in the garden.

Plant to Plate is a year 5 program with the aim to educate tamariki in growing, harvesting, and cooking healthy nutritious food. She is a super star.
